

Biographical Sketch Rabbi, civil rights activist, Albert M. Lewis was born in Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania in 1913. After

graduating from the University of Cincinnati and Hebrew Union College, he served as rabbi of Temple Isaiah in Los Angeles (1948-1978) where he was also active in civil rights and progressive political causes.

Lewis died May 2, 1991.
