Biographical Sketch Abram Simon was born in Nashville, Tennessee in 1872. Ordained as a rabbi at Hebrew Union College in

Cincinnati in 1894, Simon spent the bulk of his rabbinic career at Washington Hebrew Congregation in Washington, D.C. Simon was married to Carrie Obendorfer, a founder of the National Federation of Temple

Sisterhoods. Abram Simon died in 1938.

**Scope and Content** Collection consisting of biographical material, personal papers, correspondence, sermons, addresses, and

newsclippings; together with Simon's Ph.D. thesis, The Constructive Character and Function of Religion in

Human Progress(1907).
