Administrative Information

Biographical Sketch	Moshe Pelli, born in Israeli in 1936, is currently the Director of the Interdisciplinary Program in Judaic Studies and the Abe and Tess Wise Endowed Professor of Judaic Studies at the University of Central Florida. His major area of specialization is Modern Hebrew Literature, with concentration on Hebrew Haskalah (Enlightenment) in the 18th and 19th centuries. In addition, he has written extensively on the literature of the Holocaust, and has taught courses on the Literature of the Bible. Prof. Pelli has published twelve scholarly books on Hebrew Enlightenment, Hebrew culture in America, and literature of the Holocaust, as well as two novels and eight children's books.
Scope and Content	This collection consists of files relating to Professor Pelli's 1998 book ha-Tarbut ha-Ivrit ba-America, Hebrew Culture in America: 80 Years of Hebrew Culture in America (1916-1995). These files include handwritten notes, photocopied newspaper and journal articles, and nearprint. A full third of the collection is devoted to articles of Hadoar, a newspaper published by the Histadruth Ivrith, the Hebrew Language and Culture Association in the USA. The collection also contains extensive documentation on other publications by the Histadruth Ivrith, as well as articles on specific people associated with the Histadruth Ivrith and information on the Histadruth Ivrith's Hebrew Youth movement.
Arrangement	This collection is arranged in two (2) series: Series A. Hadoar, 1926—1991; Series B. Hebrew Culture, 1946—1998.

Scope and Content Note	Includes handwritten notes on the Histadruth Ivrith, its primary officers and organizations, and nearprint of its various publications: Ivrit ba-America (Hebrew in America), ha-Olam ha- Ivri (The Hebrew World), be-Olam ha-Ivri (Hebrew Life), ha-Kevutzah, Tarbut, Shvilei ha- Chinuch, le-Mishpachah, and The Hebrew Monthly of America. There is extensive documentation on the 1975 event "The Hebrew Month", including notes, Hebrew dictionaries for children, and juvenile biographies. There are also numerous articles in Hebrew and English from academic journals, primarily Hebrew Studies and Judaism, which address Hebrew culture and literature.
